Turkey Run State Park published Turkey Talk weekly during the 1930s. Located in Parke County, Turkey Run became Indiana's second official state park on Nov. 11, 1916. The park's name is believed to originate from wild turkeys gathering for warmth in nearby gorges, known as "runs," which allowed 19th-century hunters to easily trap and kill them.

Each "gobble" - their word for issue - of Turkey Talk covered staff and guest news and a range of activities and events at the park, as well as the occasional literary piece. The Armistice Day issue of Turkey Talk from 1938 not only highlighted the holiday which evolved into Veterans Day - and the park's own birthday - but also mentioned the imminent Thanksgiving. On page three, the staff wrote, "We're thankful for Turkey Run, the most peaceful place we know." The following issue

Human-centered design workshop scheduled



On Tuesday, Dec. 10, from 9 a.m.-12 p.m., Leadership Johnson County will present "Human-Centered Design Thinking to Innovate and Solve Problems."

Innovation is key to every job and organization. Human-centered design can improve the success of a new or existing product or service by using a problem-solving approach that puts real people at the center of the development process. It begins with empathy for customers, employees, volunteers or donors, enabling one to create products and services that resonate and are tailored to an audience's needs. The goal is to keep users' wants, pain points and preferences front of mind during every phase of the process. The inspiration, ideation and implementation tools that attendees will learn in the very interactive workshop are adaptable to any situation.

The workshop will provide a fun, effective and highly flexible introduction to human-centered

on Nov. 19, 1938 detailed the Thanksgiving Day festivities at the park, including a log chapel service, "the dinner," nature hikes and other activities such as "just plain loafing in front of the fireplace."

Quaint newsletters like Turkey Talk appeared at quite a few state parks and Civilian Conservation Corps camps across Indiana during the New Deal era. Indiana had 56 CCC companies, many of which were hosted at its state parks, including Turkey Run. Young men, ages 18 to 25, signed up for renewable sixmonth terms, working on land management and park construction projects. These workers also had the opportunity to participate in a variety of classes and recreational activities, including newsletter publishing. Many more such newsletters are available to view in the Open Spaces, Historic Places and Civilian Conservation Corps collections in the Indiana State Library Digital Collections.

The workshop will take place at the Johnson County Armory, located at 325 Minuteman Way in Franklin. participate in a nationally representative online survey. The survey seeks to capture current Black History Month programming practices across the U.S. in public libraries of widely varying size and location, as guidance for improving and strengthening Black History Month programming in libraries for the next 50 years.

Participation in the survey, even if a library does not conduct Black History Month programming, is highly valued. The survey is confidential and libraries will be selected randomly. Responses will not be attributed to an individual, a specific library or a larger library system. The survey, which will take 15-20 minutes, will help generate actionable data. Libraries may find more information about the project here and on the project website.

The research is funded by the Institute of Museum and Library Services and is being conducted by the University of Michigan in partnership with the Public Library Association and the Black Caucus of the American Library Association.
