Courts Are Open, Serving the Public

- 1.2 million cases filed in trial and appellate courts (last year)
- Remote and in-person hearings taking place everyday
- Pandemic does not stop the work of the court
- Constitutionally required for Courts to remain open



Doing Our Part In Hard Times

- Must be able to sustain constitutional and critical services as we return to post-pandemic world
- NO new budget requests from Indiana Supreme Court
- We will have increased needs and expenses going forward, but we will work to temporarily absorb costs
- Committed to ALL pandemic savings being reverted

Reverting One-Time Savings

- Self-imposed restrictions
 - Limited travel
 - Limited training
 - Limited office operations

These costs will return as we expand court technology, advance pre-trial reforms, visit counties to certify Problem-Solving Courts, host required educational trainings for judges and court staff, and work to provide critical services to Hoosiers.



Public access to online court hearings during pandemic

- Courts open through pandemic with remote capabilities and public transparency https://public.courts.in.gov/incs
- Hardware and 800 Enterprise Zoom licenses to trial courts (\$180,000 cost)
- 43,000 remote sessions with 297,000 Zoom Participants
- 13,000 streamed live through the Courts online portal (Zoom and WebEx)


Prioritizing Public Safety

All community corrections and DOC have the Supervised Release System to manage pretrial and post-conviction defendants.








Language Needs Across the State
