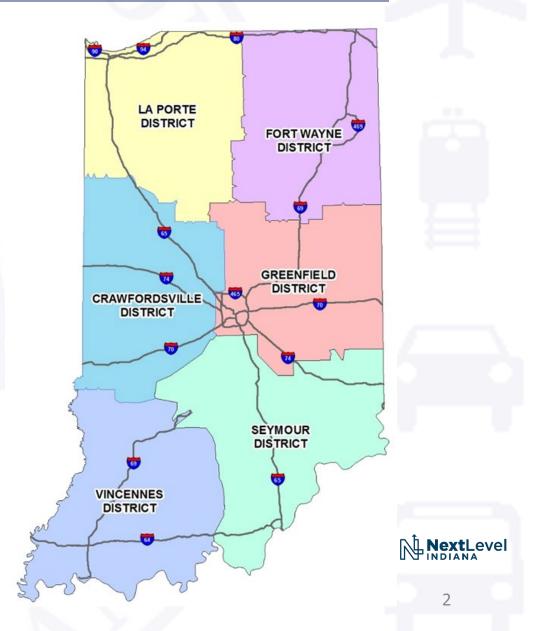

INDOT At-A-Glance

- Six district offices and a central office
- 3,551 employees (Nov, 2020)
- \$3.35 billion FY2020 budget
 - \$2.08 billion annual state capital expenditures
 - \$528 million annual operating budget
 - \$738 million in additional local capital program, multimodal, and debt service
- 29,801 total roadway lane miles
- 5,740 INDOT-owned and maintained bridges



INDOT Goals

Deliver Great Service

- Demonstrate accountability by doing what you say you're going to do at all times
- Improve Customer Service responses and issue resolution
- Modernize and increase productivity to better improve service offerings

Improve Safety through Innovation

- Improve work zone safety by implementing the Protect the Queue program, designed to alert motorists that they are approaching a work zone and need to be prepared to stop
- Partner with contractor industry stakeholders to deliver an aggressive work zone safety and Hands-Free Indiana communications campaign
- Continue implementation of employee-based innovations to modernize construction and maintenance processes and business practices, to deliver improved safety and service offerings

Execute 20-Year Road and Bridge Plan

- Deliver the Next Level Roads plan to improve pavement and bridge quality, safety and mobility
 - Priority given to construction zone safety for workers and motorists
 - Focus on engineering, education, enforcement and emergency response
- Identify continuous improvements of the Asset Management process
- Convey Next Level construction projects through effective and efficient communication strategies

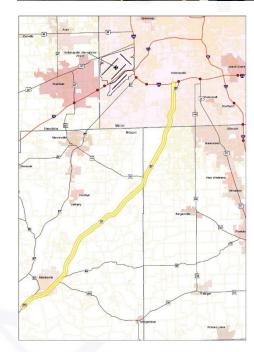
Develop INDOT's 21st Century Workforce

Major Projects - Current

- I-69 Section 6:
 - Martinsville to Indianapolis
 - Construction began in 2019
 - Scheduled Completion: 2024
 - Estimate: \$2.02B
 - 35 Added lane miles, 39 new bridges, & rehab of 35 existing bridges
- I-65/I-70 North Split:
 - Downtown Indianapolis
 - Construction scheduled to begin in 2021
 - Scheduled Completion: 2022
 - Estimate: \$383.3M
- Sherman Minton Bridge:
 - Construction Begins 2021
 - Scheduled Completion: 2023
 - Estimate: \$100M

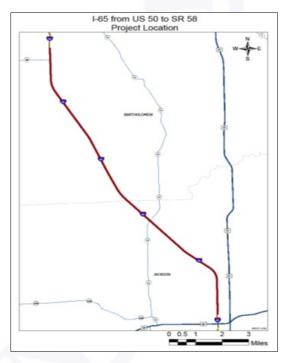


Expanding Interstate Capacity

- I-65 Clark County Opened to Traffic November 2018. Added 13 lane miles.
- I-65 Lake County Opened to Traffic June 2019. Added 16 lane miles.
- I-69 Madison County Opened to Traffic December 2019. Added 7 lane miles.
- I-65 Bartholomew County Opened to Traffic August 2020. Added 28 lane miles.

Local Projects - Community Crossings

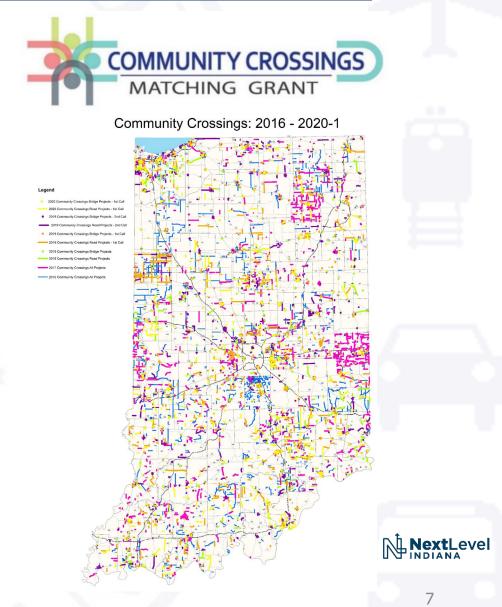

- 2020-2 Call for Projects: Sept. 25-Oct. 23
 - Amount to be awarded: \$101.5 million to 238 separate communities for 1,527 road and bridge projects
 - Awarding Target: December 2020
- 2020-1 Awarded \$126.5 million to 214 separate communities for 2,091 road and bridge projects

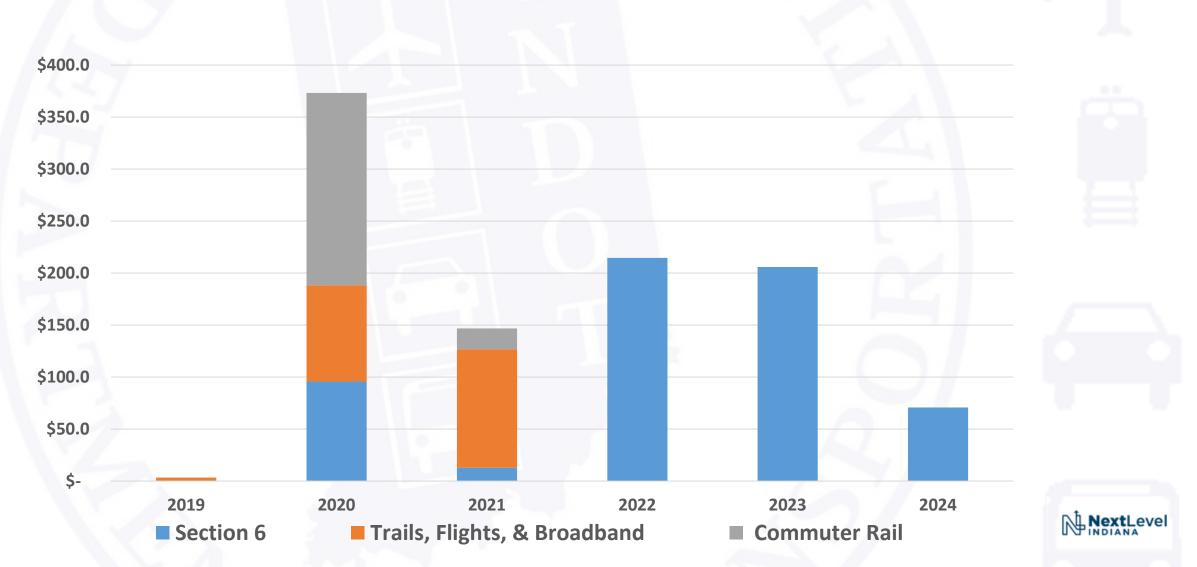
• 2019

- Awarded \$214.5 million to 370 separate communities for 3,400 road and bridge projects
- 2016-2018
 - Awarded \$397.7 million to 531 separate communities for 5,102 road and bridge projects

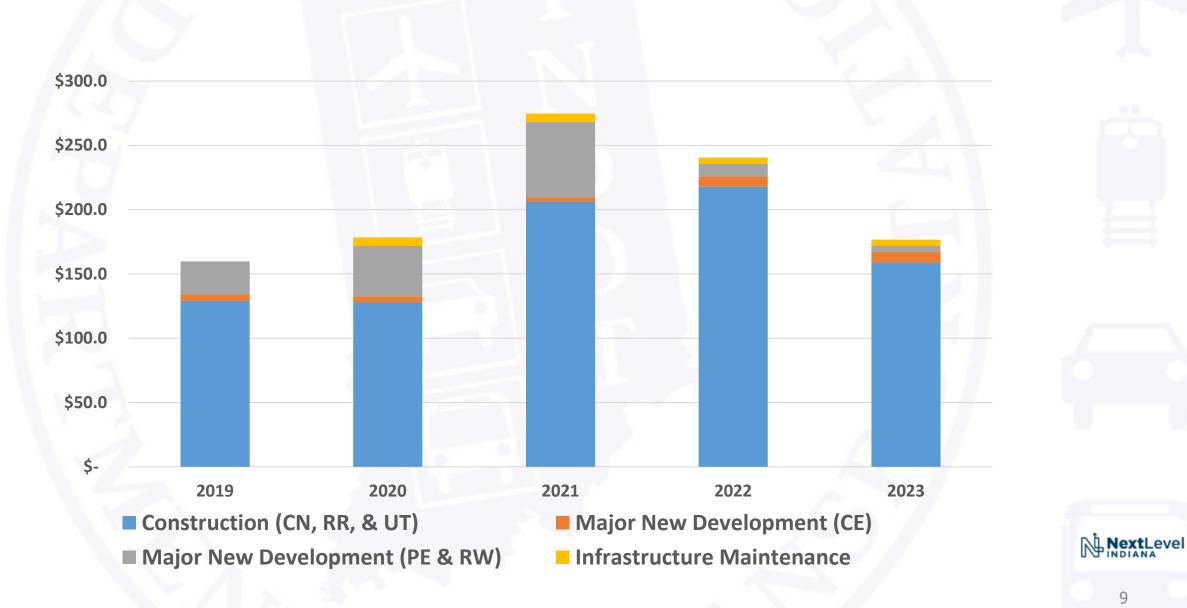

COVID-19

- Relief Assistance
 - Partnered with ISP, ISDH, IDHS, IEDC, and Indiana National Guard to deliver medical supplies in all 92 Indiana counties
 - 3.2 million pairs of gloves
 - 4.3 million surgical masks
 - 3.8 million N95 respirators
 - 1.1 million face shields
 - 1 million surgical gowns
 - 228,000 gallons of hand sanitizer

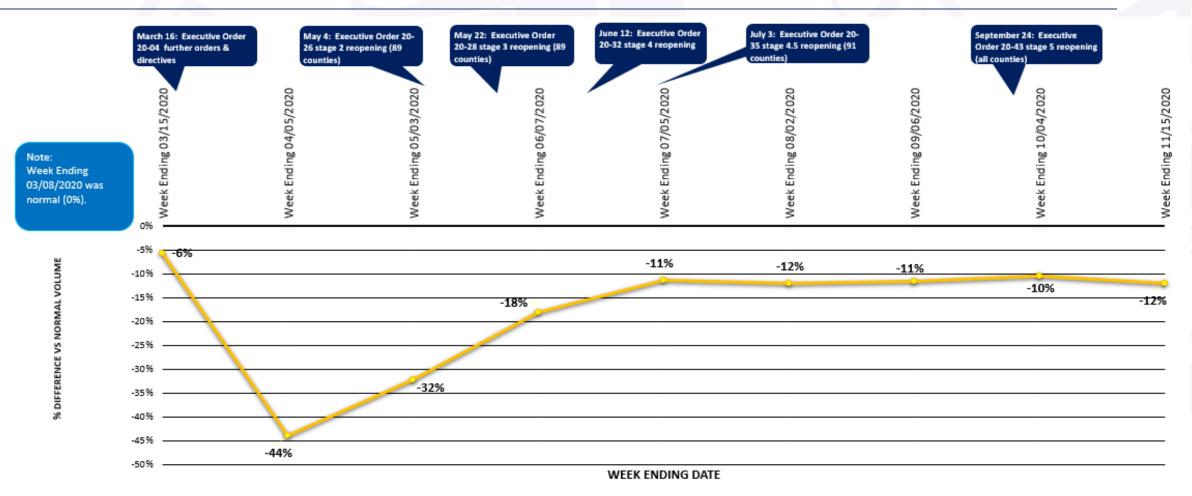

COVID-19: Change in Indiana Traffic Volume

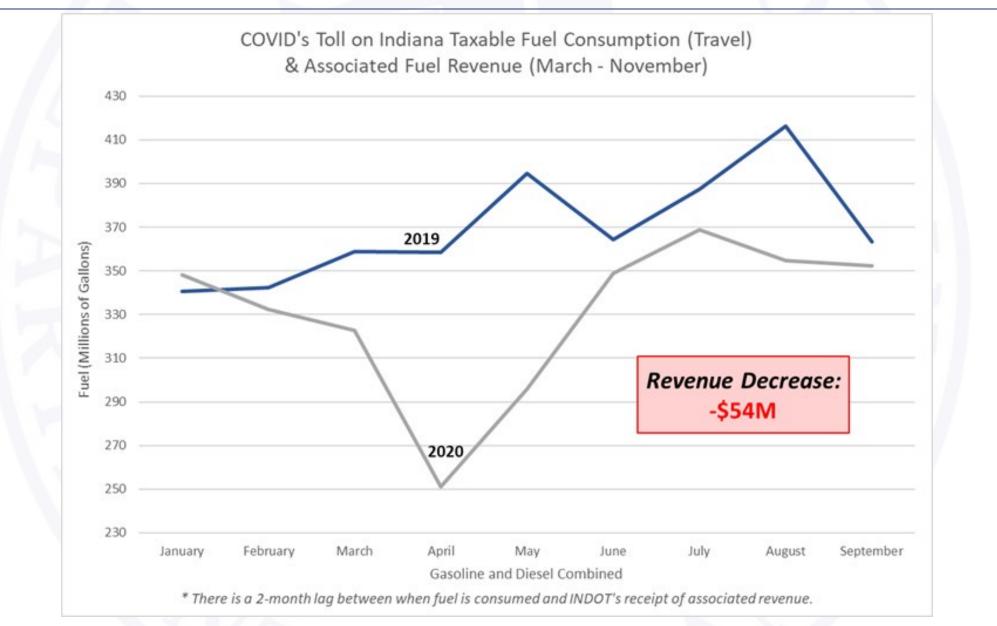


All Vehicles (seasonally adjusted)

Fewer vehicle miles traveled translates into reduced fuel-related revenue for INDOT



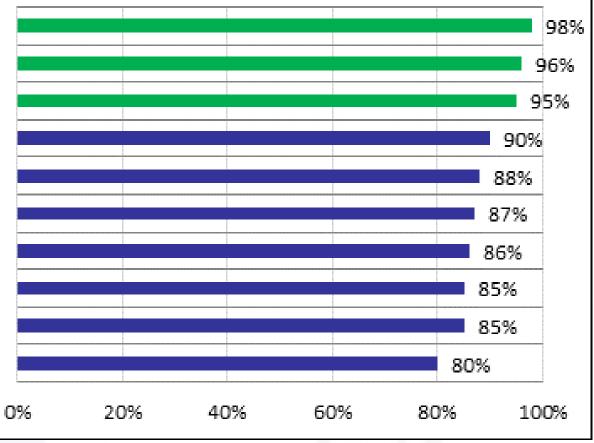
COVID-19: Decline in Traffic Impact on Revenue

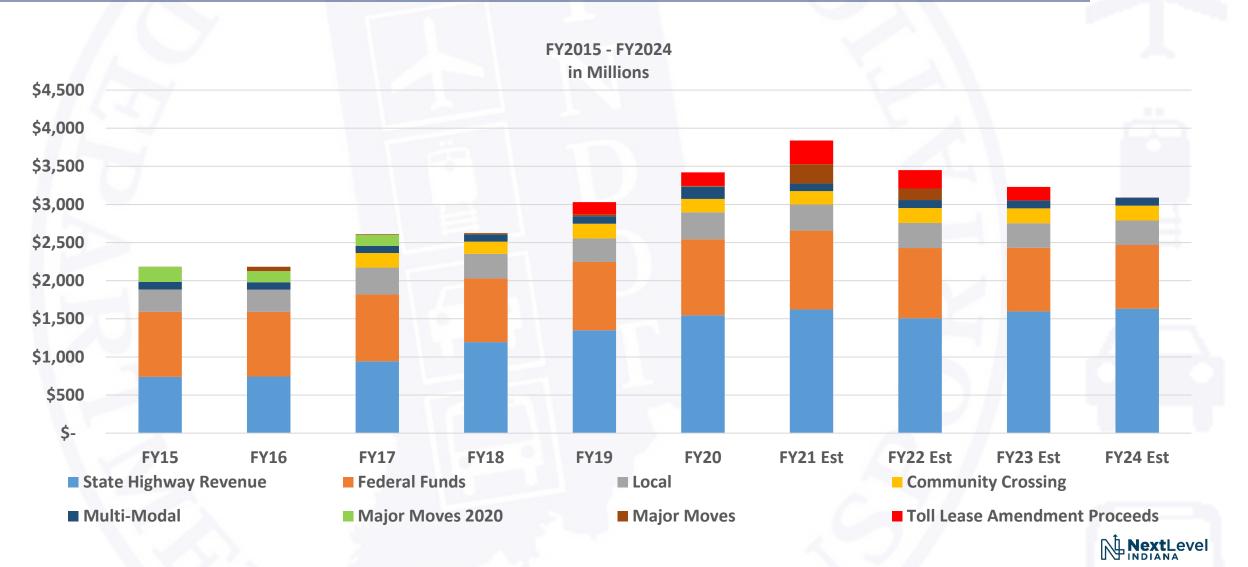






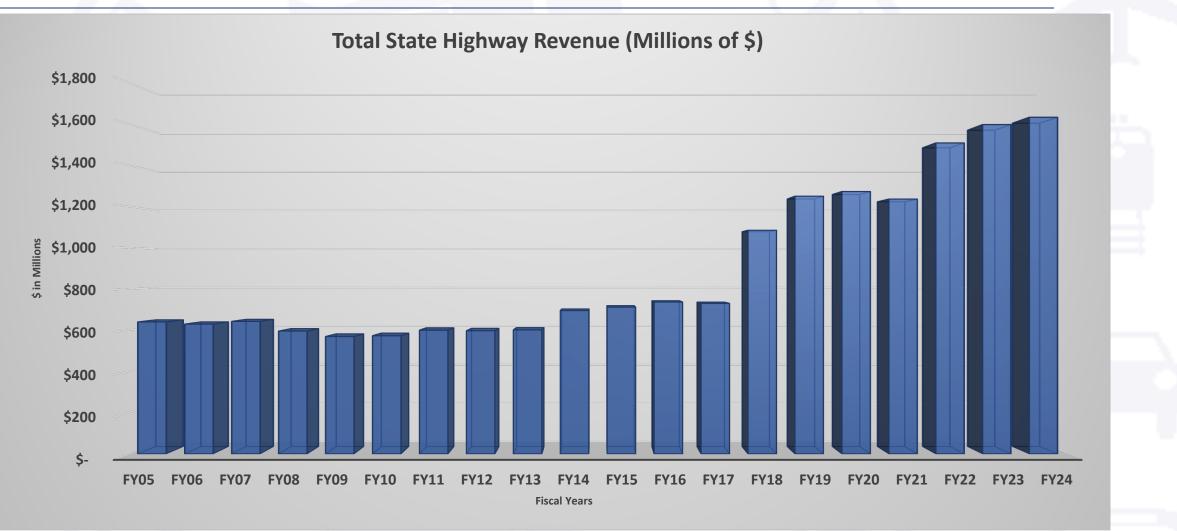


Total Revenues & Resources

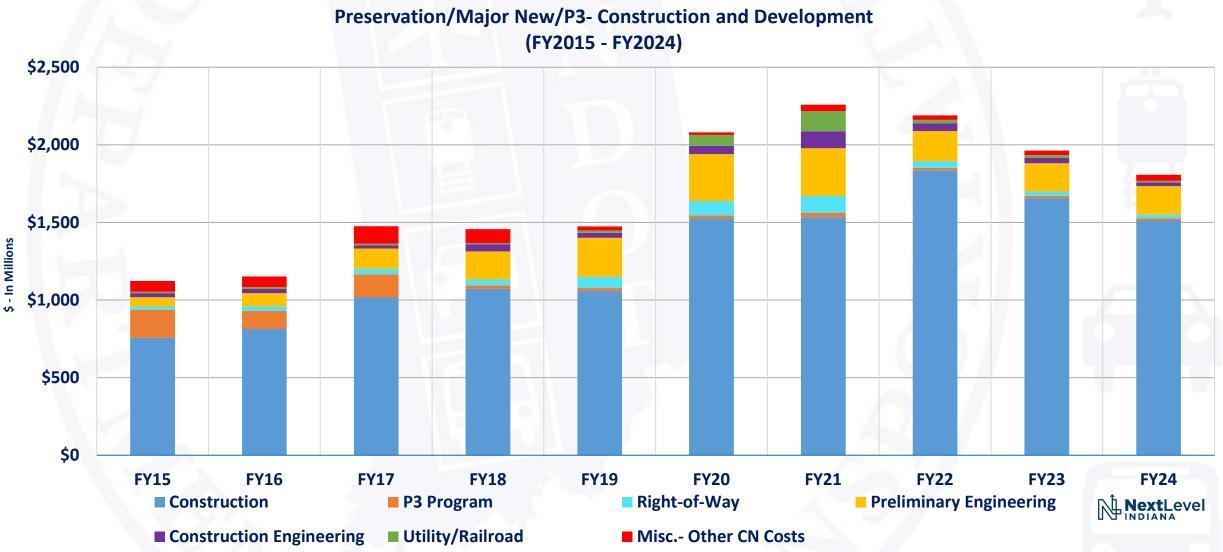
Total State Highway Revenue* (SHF, SHRCIF and Crossroads)

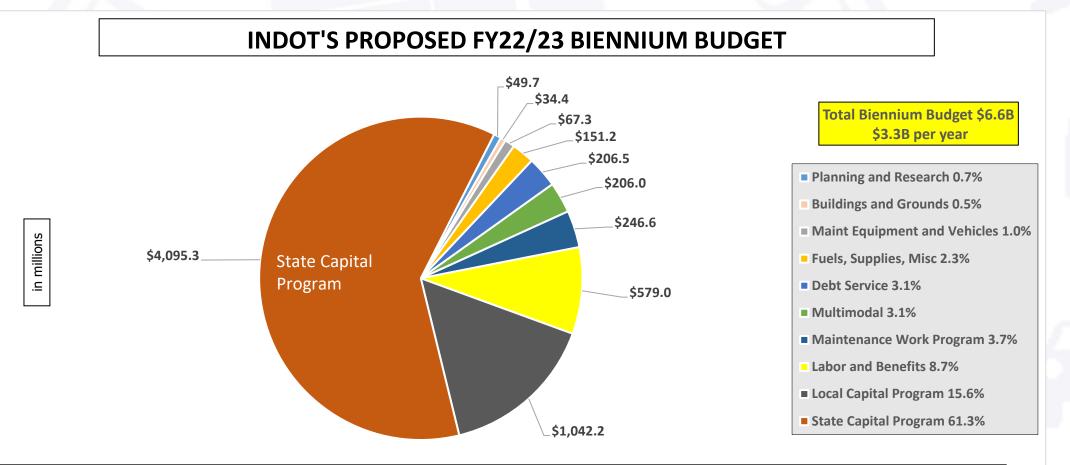

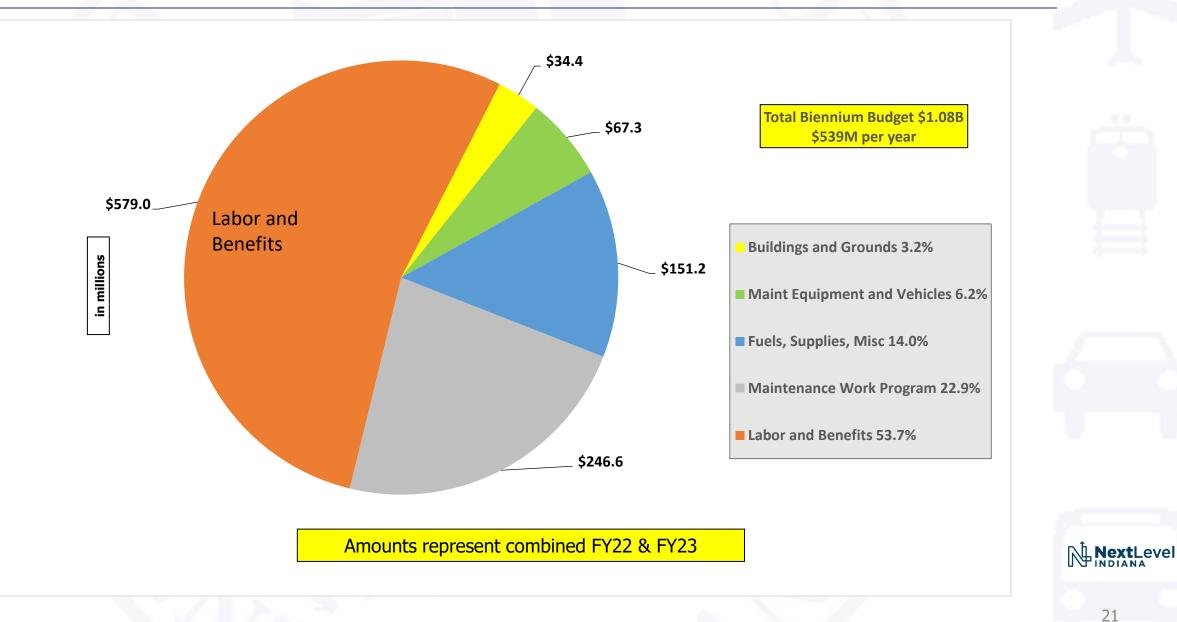
