

PART IV: PROGRAMS – CHARTER SCHOOL OF THE DUNES

Positive Behavior Intervention Supports (PBIS) – CSD works toward encouraging positive behavior through modeled expectations, and celebrating students making positive choices. A tiered system is embedded that includes guidance and criteria for students requiring additional support with behavioral challenges.

Social Emotional Learning (SEL) – CSD offers social emotional support to students through teacher training, circle time, CICO, and Brain Lab.

Academic RTI (Tier III) – In an effort to ensure students can meet or exceed high academic standards, additional layers are put in place to remediate prerequisite skills and build appropriate background knowledge.

Crown Counseling – CSD acknowledges the therapeutic needs of students and staff. Crown Counseling is available full-time to provide therapy services to both the staff and students.

PART IV: PROGRAMS – CHARTER SCHOOL OF THE DUNES

Trauma Team – CSD provides support to any students who have experienced trauma and develop systems of support.

CPI (Crisis Prevention Institute) – CSD has staff members trained to assist with non-violent interventions to meet the needs of students.

Title I Paraprofessionals – CSD staff includes a paraprofessional team assigned to grade levels to support small group instruction.

PATINS (Promoting Achievement Through Technology and Instruction for all Students) – The PATINS project is a state-wide technical assistance network that connects Indiana's local education agencies to resources.

HA (High Ability) – CSD identifies and services high ability students pursuant to the Indiana Code that defines a student with high abilities. CSD identifies and provides service to students in grades K-8 with direct services from a high ability teacher.

PART IV: PROGRAMS – CHARTER SCHOOL OF THE DUNES

EL (English Learning) – Per ESSA requirements and through guidance by the IDOE, CSD identifies and serves students who have indicated a language other than English on the original Home Language Survey, and have a proficiency level of <5 when given the WIDA Placement or Access assessment. Services are developed through the Title III Administrator to support the classroom setting, testing, and resource time.

Online Support Program (Exact Path) – Exact Path is utilized by grades K-8 for individualized Math support.

Online Support Program (MindPlay) – MindPlay is utilized by grades 2-8 for individualized literacy support.

Online Support Program (Reading Eggs) – Reading Eggs is utilized by grades 2-8 for individualized literacy support.

CSD Champions – Mentor program designed for students in grades 3-8 who are either near ILEARN proficiency according to the 18-19 ILEARN results, and/or between 41st-60th percentile on the Fall 2020 NWEA in Math and/or Reading.

PEARLS and SIZZLE – PEARLS and SIZZLE are mentoring programs focused on empowering teens, establishing relationships, and opening the door to post-CSD opportunities.

V: PARENT PARTICIPATION – CHARTER SCHOOL OF THE DUNES

Family Friendly School – CSD was a 2019-2020 award recipient from the IDOE for involvement and family engagement.

Parent/Teacher Conferences – In addition to teacher meetings with parents as needed, formal parent/teacher conferences are held at the end of the first and third quarter each year.

Black History – During the Black History Program, parents made food dishes for sampling and participated in singing and dancing.

Muffins for Moms & Donuts for Dads – Parents played games, shared recipes and entered several activity sheet contests.

Special Olympics Information – CSD hosted a Special Olympics event in the gym. Students with disabilities played and competed in various sports while parents watched, cheered and learned about the various sports to involve their children.

V: PARENT PARTICIPATION – CHARTER SCHOOL OF THE DUNES

Grandparents Day – This event attracted several grandparents as they played games, had light refreshments, and danced to the tunes of oldies but goodies.

Veterans – As a way of bonding, families worked together on holiday cards that were mailed to service men and women in the military.

Thanksgiving – In celebration of the holiday season, parents and families were invited to a “Thanksgiving Holiday Luncheon and Gifting,” where they were engaged in singing, watching holiday movies and coloring contests for the youth. Families received clothing, household items and toiletries for the entire family.

Christmas – During Christmas, more than 50 families received brand new clothing for each child in the family that included coats, shoes, pants, tops, underwear and more. CSD hosted a Christmas Program with selections from the school choir.

Field Trips – Parents are requested to chaperone by teachers on field trips as long as they pass a background check.

PART IV: PROGRAMS – HAMMOND ACADEMY OF SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY

Special Education (2 Teachers, 2 Teacher Aides) – Students are able to meet with the teachers and aides and work in the special education suite (and via Google Meet) during the school day.

Title I (2 Teachers, 2 Teacher Aides) – There is a teacher and aide available to students during the day for both Math and English.

Social Worker – Students meet at regularly appointed times with the part-time social worker for ongoing therapy.

School Guidance Counselors – Students can reach out to either of two full-time school guidance counselors. One counselor is dedicated primarily to student academic performance. The other counselor is dedicated primarily to student social-emotional well-being.

Summer School - HAST operated 2020 summer school in an entirely virtual mode, including credit recovery, physical education, health education and more.

Grade Level Teams/Individual Teachers – Each grade level and each teacher is keeping track of students who are falling behind or failing to be present in their classes. Teachers have also built in unstructured time to allow students the opportunity to reach out for academic or social-emotional support.

PART V: PARENT PARTICIPATION – HAMMOND ACADEMY OF SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY

Virtual Conferences – In the week following the end of the first quarter, each grade level teacher team coordinated one on one virtual conferences with their parents.

PATH – The HAST parent-teacher organization continues to operate, with monthly zoom meetings.

Athletics – HAST operated a fall sports season of volleyball, tennis, and cross country. Parents served as coaches, assistant coaches, and spectators.

Administration Office – Parents are able to make appointments to come in with any questions regarding student records, student academics, or student fees.

Parent Surveys – In anticipation for each of the academic quarters this year, parents have completed a survey that addresses the instructional plan as well as the academic and social-emotional well-being of their children. The survey results have been helpful in guiding HAST staff to identify the needs of families.
