RE: Latch Key Program Waiver Request—Fairfield Community Schools

Recommendation: Approve the Latch Key Program Waiver Request.

Fairfield Community Schools ("Fairfield") is seeking approval of a school-age child care program requirement waiver for the 2019-2020 school year. Approval by the Indiana State Board of Education ("Board") is required for Latch Key program waivers according to IC 20-26-5-2.

School-age child care programs, commonly known as Latch Key programs, are programs which provide care and education for children of working parents. This program is designed to be a link between the home and the school. Certified, qualified and experienced child care providers supervise, teach and interact with children to ensure that they are cared for, supervised, exposed to many learning activities, allowed to complete homework and share enjoyment in a relaxed and carefully designed developmentally appropriate environment.

A school corporation may seek a waiver from the child care program requirement if the school corporation believes compliance with the requirement would result in "undue hardship." IC 20-26-5-2(c) explains:

(c) A school corporation shall receive a waiver from the state board of the requirement under subsection (a) if the school corporation believes that the school corporation would experience an undue hardship due to a low number of eligible children intending to use a child care program, regardless of whether the child care program is conducted by the school corporation or under a contractual agreement. To receive a waiver, the school corporation must include a detailed description of the school corporation's attempt to implement a child care program, including the following:

(1) A description of the steps taken to:

(A) conduct a child care program described in subsection (a)(1); or

(B) actively solicit nonprofit organizations or for-profit organizations to implement a child care program as provided in subsection (a)(2).

(2) Evidence that a request in writing was made to each parent to contact the school corporation to indicate the parent's willingness to use a child care program and documentation of the results received from parents. In other words, to be eligible for such a waiver, the school corporation must demonstrate that it has made a good-faith effort to determine the feasibility of creating such a program as well as parent interest in utilizing a Latch Key program.

The Indiana Department of Education's ("Department") publicized deadline for all waiver requests is September 1st of each year.¹ Fairfield's Latch Key program waiver request was submitted prior to the deadline.

Fairfield provided supporting documentation, including:

- A written description of the steps taken to determine the feasibility of a Latch Key program and/or to actively solicit other non-profit or for-profit organizations to implement the program.
- Evidence that a request in writing was made to all parents to contact the school corporation to indicate their willingness to utilize the Latch Key program and documentation of any parental survey results.
- Analysis of parent interest and projected attendance from the implementation of such a program.
- The nature of the hardship that the school corporation would experience due to a low number of eligible children intending to utilize the Latch Key program services.

The Department has deferred to the Board's discretion for approval or rejection of Fairfield's Latch Key program waiver request for the 2019-2020 school year.

Recommendation: as IC 20-26-5-2(c) states that a "school corporation shall receive a waiver" if it provides the information outlined in the statute, Board staff recommend granting the waiver.

- 3. The nature of the hardship that the school corporation would experience due to a low number of eligible children intending to utilize the services of the latch-key program, as described in item 2 of this request, regardless of whether the latch-key program is conducted by the school or under a contractual agreement. [IC 20-26-5-2(c)]

The school corporation believes that the hardship described in item 3 of this request constitutes an undue hardship, and requests that the Indiana State Board of Education grant a waiver of the requirements of IC 20-26-5-2 for the

WAIVER FORM 2019-20 School Year

Indiana State Board of Education School Age Child-Care Program Waiver

FAIRFIELD COMMUNITY SCHOOLS requests a waiver of the requirement that it make a school-age child-care program available to all children in Kindergarten through Grade 6 as required by IC 20-26-5-2. In support of this request, the school corporation submits the following detailed information required by law:

1. A description of the steps taken to conduct its own latch key program or to actively solicit other not-for-profit organizations or for-profit organizations to implement the latch key program. [IC 20-26-5-2 (c) (1)]

The three (3) elementary schools in the corporation (Benton, Millersburg, & New Paris) sent out surveys in the community to gain input on the need for a school-age child-care program. The results were tallied according to those students attending each of the three elementary schools next school year. The results are provided below:

2. Evidence that a request in writing was made to all parents to contact the school corporation to indicate willingness to utilize the latch-key program (attached copy) and documentation of the results received from parents in this regard. [IC 20-26-5-2 (c) (2)]

A survey was sent home. A copy of the form that was sent from each school is enclosed.

3. The nature of the hardship that the school corporation would experience due to a low number of eligible children intending to utilize the services of the latch-key program, as described in Section 2 of this request regardless of whether the latch-key program is conducted by the school or under a contractual agreement. [IC 20-26-5-2 (c)] (Please include a detailed analysis of the financial hardship.)

Cost of such a program versus the income would not be profitable and it is doubtful all persons indicating interest in the program would actually follow through.

See attached "Exhibit A" for the cost estimate.

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4. Based upon the Indiana Department of Education letter dated 8/14/2003, which stated "since the legislation does not require that a school-age child care (latch-key) program be offered in each elementary school building, just that a program be made available to all children in Grades K-6 and transportation provided in order to meet a reasonable level of program access, that an investigation regarding the feasibility of offering such a program at just one site, New Paris Elementary, be conducted for school year 2004-2005". The investigation regarding the feasibility of offering the program for 2019-2020 school year was completed, with the cost estimate being attached as "Exhibit B".

The school corporation believes that the hardship described in Section 3 or Section 4 of this request constitutes an undue hardship, and requests that the Indiana State Board of Education grant a waiver of the requirements of IC 20-26-5-2 for the 2019-20 school year.

New Business

Business Manager Phil Menzie was absent.

Interim Superintendent Bruce Stahly presented the recommendation from Phil Menzie, Business Manager to approve the following expense items over \$20,000

- 1. A new Combi Oven at Fairfield Jr-Sr High School in the amount of \$26,175.34 to be paid to C&T Designs from School Lunch Funds.
- 2. Asphalt sealing and crack filling at New Paris Elementary School by Super Seal Inc., in the amount of \$21,334.00

Greg Kitson made and Sarah Elledge supported the motion, the motion passed unanimously.

Interim Superintendent Bruce Stahly presented the recommendation from Phil Menzie, Business Manager to approve the request for waiver of the requirement to offer an After-School Child Care Program for the 2019-20 school year based upon the analysis that shows that t his program would be cost prohibitive. Trent Hostetler made and Greg Kitson supported the motion, the motion passed unanimously.

Interim Superintendent Bruce Stahly presented the recommendation from Phil Menzie, Business Manager to approve Meal Price Increases for 2019-20 based upon requirements from USDA. Prices for lunches to increase by .10 cents for Students and Adults. Adult breakfast will increase by .05 cents. Trent Hostetler made and Greg Kitson supported the motion, the motion passed unanimously.

Interim Superintendent Bruce Stahly presented the recommendation from Phil Menzie, Business Manager to approve application for Common School Fund Loan in the amount of \$215,213.00 for the purchase of student computers. Sarah Elledge made and Greg Kitson supported the motion, the motion passed unanimously.

Interim Superintendent Bruce Stahly presented the recommendation from Phil Menzie, Business Manager to approve a purchase over \$20,000 for bus cameras for the interior and stop arms to be purchased from Midwest Transit Equipment. Greg Kitson made and Aaron Rink supported the motion, the motion passed unanimously.

Assistant Superintendent, Monica Kegerreis introduced Fairfield Jr-Sr High School English Teachers Ann Carboneau and Megan Davidhizar who presented information on a Pilot Program for 10th and 11th Grade Honors Book Selection Program. Recommended that Textbook Rental Fees be used to purchase books for the program. Aaron Rink made and Greg Kitson supported the motion, the motion passed unanimously.

Assistant Superintendent, Monica Kegerreis presented information regarding HEA 1001, Section 223 Amended Kindergarten enrollment date change for inclusion in ADM count, no change to kindergarten entrance age – at least 5 by August 1. No action required.

Interim Superintendent Bruce Stahly recommended the board approve a Highly Effective Performance Stipend in the amount of \$3,000 for Dr. Steve Thalheimer for school year 2017-18 which is the same amount as 2016-17. Greg Kitson made and Aaron Rink supported the motion, the motion passed unanimously.

Interim Superintendent Bruce Stahly recommended the board approve Teacher on Special Assignment positions at Benton & New Paris Elementary Schools to assist principals with walk-through evaluations. Trent Hostetler made and Greg Kitson supported the motion, the motion passed unanimously.

Interim Superintendent Bruce Stahly recommended the board approve a change to a Licensed Classified Contract for Speech Language Pathologist Handbook which includes Hiring Pay Schedule. Aaron Rink made and Greg Kitson supported the motion, the motion passed unanimously.

Interim Superintendent Bruce Stahly recommended the board approve a resolution adding the Speech Language Pathologist position to a Public Employee Retirement Fund (PERF) Covered Position. Trent Hostetler made and Sarah Elledge supported the motion, the motion passed unanimously.

Interim Superintendent Bruce Stahly recommended the board table the motion for the addition of a Social Work position for corporation until next month. Trent Hostetler made and Greg Kitson supported the motion to table, the motion to table passed unanimously.

Interim Superintendent Bruce Stahly recommended the board approve changes in the athletic eligibility for these non-full-time Fairfield Students: Homeschooled, Non-Public/Non-Accredited School students, Innovative School students and Virtual School students. These changes are in-line with IHSAA eligibility guidelines. Trent Hostetler made and Sarah Elledge supported the motion, the motion passed unanimously.

Interim Superintendent Bruce Stahly recommended the board approve transfer student caps as outlined below with a deadline for applications of May 31st. If caps are reached by this deadline, then there will be a random drawing for accepting students. If caps are not reached by this deadline date, then transfer students will continue to be admitted and approved on a first come basis until caps are reached or February 1, 2020 whichever comes first. All kindergarten classes will be capped at 24-25 students with the possibility of an added paraprofessional. Also recommended that the board waive any transfer tuition charges for students for the 2019-20 school year.

Recommendation: Approve the Latch Key Program Waiver Request.

Greensburg Community School Corporation ("Greensburg") is seeking approval of a school-age child care program requirement waiver for the 2019-2020 school year. Approval by the Indiana State Board of Education ("Board") is required for Latch Key program waivers according to IC 20-26-5-2.

School-age child care programs, commonly known as Latch Key programs, are programs which provide care and education for children of working parents. This program is designed to be a link between the home and the school. Certified, qualified and experienced child care providers supervise, teach and interact with children to ensure that they are cared for, supervised, exposed to many learning activities, allowed to complete homework and share enjoyment in a relaxed and carefully designed developmentally appropriate environment.

A school corporation may seek a waiver from the child care program requirement if the school corporation believes compliance with the requirement would result in "undue hardship." IC 20-26-5-2(c) explains:

(c) A school corporation shall receive a waiver from the state board of the requirement under subsection (a) if the school corporation believes that the school corporation would experience an undue hardship due to a low number of eligible children intending to use a child care program, regardless of whether the child care program is conducted by the school corporation or under a contractual agreement. To receive a waiver, the school corporation must include a detailed description of the school corporation's attempt to implement a child care program, including the following:

(1) A description of the steps taken to:

(A) conduct a child care program described in subsection (a)(1); or

(B) actively solicit nonprofit organizations or for-profit organizations to implement a child care program as provided in subsection (a)(2).

(2) Evidence that a request in writing was made to each parent to contact the school corporation to indicate the parent's willingness to use a child care program and documentation of the results received from parents. In other words, to be eligible for such a waiver, the school corporation must demonstrate that it has made a good-faith effort to determine the feasibility of creating such a program as well as parent interest in utilizing a Latch Key program.

The Indiana Department of Education's ("Department") publicized deadline for all waiver requests is September 1st of each year.¹ Greensburg's Latch Key program waiver request was submitted prior to the deadline.

Greensburg provided supporting documentation, including:

- A written description of the steps taken to determine the feasibility of a Latch Key program and/or to actively solicit other non-profit or for-profit organizations to implement the program.
- Evidence that a request in writing was made to all parents to contact the school corporation to indicate their willingness to utilize the Latch Key program and documentation of any parental survey results.
- Analysis of parent interest and projected attendance from the implementation of such a program.
- The nature of the hardship that the school corporation would experience due to a low number of eligible children intending to utilize the Latch Key program services.

The Department has deferred to the Board's discretion for approval or rejection of Greensburg's Latch Key program waiver request for the 2019-2020 school year.

Recommendation: as IC 20-26-5-2(c) states that a "school corporation shall receive a waiver" if it provides the information outlined in the statute, Board staff recommend granting the waiver.

Latch Key Waiver (Indiana Code 20-26-5-2)

School corporations may seek a waiver from the child care program requirement if compliance would result in "undue financial hardship." To be eligible for such a waiver, the school corporation must demonstrate that it has made a good-faith effort to implement a program and that, after sufficient notification, there was too little interest in such a program for implementation to be economically feasible.

Latch Key Waiver Form

As part of a waiver request, school corporations must present:

- A written description of the steps taken to conduct a latch key program and/or to actively solicit other nonprofits or for-profits organizations to implement a program – Example: A copy of child care solicitation letter and proposal from outside child care vendor with written description.
- Evidence that a request in writing was made to all parents to contact the school corporation to indicate their willingness to utilize the latch key program and documentation of any parent survey results – Example: A copy of the parent survey and results.
- The nature of the hardship that the school corporation would experience due to a low number of eligible children intending to utilize the latch key program services.
- Detailed financial analysis including the projected costs, attendance, and income expected from the implementation of such a program – Example: An estimated cost of staff wages and benefits, educational materials, transportation costs, and program income.

Note 2: School corporations must submit a **new waiver request each school year**.

Note 3: DEADLINE: SEPTEMBER 1st ANNUALLY.

Greensburg Community School Corporation requests a waiver of the requirement that it make a school age child care program available to all children in K-6 as required by IC 20-26-5-2. The corporation submits the following detailed information that is required by law to support the request:

- 1. A description of the steps taken by the school corporation to conduct a latch key program or solicit other not-for-profit organizations or for-profit organizations to implement the program. IC 20-26-5-2(a)
 - a. Decatur County Day Care (bus transportation provided by GCS)

b. Decatur County YMCA (bus transportation provided by GCS) There was no interest on the part of either of these current providers to have a program located in the elementary school. Both have facilities that currently provide school age child care and do not want to engage in programs not housed in their facilities. The YMCA currently offers an after-school program through a grant for elementary age children at Greensburg Elementary (3:00 to 6:00 pm daily for 80-100 students).

2. A survey was sent to each parent, with a return date of April 30, 2019, concerning interest in the latch key program.

Results of the survey: 2019-2020 School Year 1068 surveys were sent home to parents K-6 26 surveys were returned expressing interest (42 students interested)

There were a total of 1068 surveys distributed; the elementary school distributed 899 and the middle school distributed 169.

- A. Evidence is provided that a request was made to all parents, in writing, concerning the latch key program (copy enclosed).
- B. The results of the 2019-2020 survey indicate that the parents of the Greensburg Community School Corporation are not interested in the latch key program. The results of the survey (42/1068)) indicated there was no need for the latch key program to be further pursued.
