About: The mission of Upward Bound is to prepare each participant for successful entrance into a college or university. This college preparatory program is designed to assist students with the development of their academic skills and to provide guidance for success beyond high school. To do so, students participate in two program components: a six-week Summer Academy, which includes a residential stay, and a nine-month academic year component, which supplements the traditional school year.

Programming: Point person David Hardy has re-launched sign up efforts for Arlington scholars. Mr. Hardy will be signing up scholars for the upcoming Upward Bound summer 2013 program. Currently 9 Arlington scholars participate in IUPUI's Upward Bound program and 10-15 more 9th-10th grade scholars will be recruited.






7th Grade Acuity Reading Scores




7th Grade Acuity Math Scores




8th Grade Acuity Reading Scores




8th Grade Acuity Math Scores



Algebra I Acuity Averages






English 10 Acuity Averages




10th Grade NWEA - Math
