re: Vote Center

Dear Election Division,

In 1999 Floyd County changed from the iron lever machines to the Eagle Optech ballot scanning system which was followed later by the AutoMark. The purchase cost to the taxpayers was over \$500,000. The voters have confidence in these machines and election results have stood up to several recounts. However, with the phasing out of the Eagle and the possibility of not finding replacement parts I proposed to the Election Board that this would be a good time to explore the Vote Center concept.

We started in February 2012 by forming a committee of County Commissioners and County Council members, IT people, poll workers, political party members, advocates for people with special needs, school board and school administrators, Housing Directors and advocates for the homeless. All meetings were advertised and open to the public.

Our first meeting gave people an overview of our situation and some details of the vote center concept. We assigned people to certain areas to gather information to bring back to the next meeting. We also reviewed the experiences and Plans that other vote center counties used to guide us. After several meetings the Election Board unanimously voted to move toward developing a Vote Center Plan, we believed at this time it would be user friendly for the voter and economically feasible for the county.

At one of the meetings vendors were invited to come to New Albany High School to display their voting machine hardware and software, it also included e-poll books. This event was advertised and open to the public. A draft of a vote center plan was distributed at the next meeting. We then requested and advertised for the vendors to submit proposals which remained sealed until an open scheduled meeting where the proposals were opened. The Election Board reviewed the proposals and based our

decision on voter usability, equipment certifications, and cost decided on RBM Consulting for the election machines and the e-poll books.

A population density study was done to determine vote center locations. Our county decided to use ten locations. In our plan there are two schools listed. During 2013 we are going to review these areas to try to locate two other locations. The school corporation has concerns for security, parking and congestion. If two other sites can be found in that area so that the towns of Georgetown and Greenville can be serviced we will amend the plan. All of the vote center locations have been polling sites and voters are used to those locations. They are also all handicapped accessible. Bus schedules and major traffic areas were considered.

With the final pieces of the puzzle completed the Vote Center Plan was complete and presented to the public at two public meetings. Security of the voting data and polling site locations were areas of concern which were addressed and will continue to be dealt with as we move forward. At the Commissioners meeting in November 2012 the contract with RBM will be considered and in December 2012 it will move to the County Council for the appropriation of the funds.

During 2013 we plan to use that non-election year to educate ourselves and the public on this new concept. We will attend community events, organizational meetings and perhaps have a mock election during our fall Harvest Homecoming festival. I felt that the timing was right for this change. Our machines are old and will be needing repairs that we may not be able to get parts for. Vote Centers save money and have been very successful in other Indiana counties. With no election in 2013 it gives us time to educate the voter. As County Clerk with 16 years experience in election administration, I will be leaving office in 2014. I can have one election cycle completed before a new Clerk comes in, a situation that would be very difficult for a new office holder. With this plan the county will be in excellent shape to execute elections for the next decade.

I would like to thank all the people that came to the meetings and contributed to this process. I appreciate the questions, concerns and excitement that people have showed during this year.

I respectfully submit to the Indiana Election Division the Floyd County Vote Center Plan for approval.

ADOPTED VOTE CENTER PLAN FOR FLOYD COUNTY, INDIANA
ACCORDING TO IC 3-11-18-1

According to IC 3-11-18 Chapter 19.1 Section 3, the Floyd County Election Board has complied by:

The Election Board held two public meetings 30 days apart where the vote center draft plans were passed out to each individual in attendance. September 5, 2012 and October 10, 2012. There were also multiple public meetings which began in February 2012.

During all of our public meetings concerns were raised about the following:

Security of the voting tabulation. Making sure that no one can obtain voting results at any part of the process.

Making sure the vote center locations were accessible and distributed around the county.

That the bus routes are near vote center locations.

The Order approving the vote center draft plan by the unanimous vote of the Floyd County Election Board is attached.

Vote Center and Satellite Vote Locations

Floyd County plans to utilize 10 vote center locations. Indiana Code 3-11-18.1-6 only requires one vote center per 10,000 active voters, but the Floyd County Election Board plans to provide one vote center per roughly 5286 active voters. Effective date January 1, 2013.

As of June 19, 2012:

- (A) Total number of registered voters within Floyd County – 55966
- (B) Total number of active voters within Floyd County – 53,851
- (C) Total number of inactive voters in Floyd County-2115

The following are suggested vote center locations to be open on Election Day:
(The following locations will be reviewed and amended prior to election cycle)

1. Christ's Church of the Nazarene
2. Pineview Government Center
3. Tunnel Hill Church
4. NAHA 300 Building
5. NA-FC Library Building
6. 4-H Fair Grounds
7. Floyd Knobs Community Club
8. Grace Lutheran
9. Georgetown Elementary
10. Greenville Elementary

The following are suggested satellite vote center locations to be open for Early Voting:

1. NAHA 300 Building
2. New Albany/Floyd County Library

The following are suggested satellite vote center locations for the two Saturdays prior to the election:

1. NAHA 300 Building
2. Tunnel Hill Church

NOTE: Voters from every precinct may vote at any vote center location or satellite vote center location. Every ballot style for each precinct in Floyd County will be available at

each vote center and each satellite vote center (Depending on the election, the number of ballot styles varies greatly; therefore, this plan does not attempt to provide a specific number of ballot styles). Each vote center and early vote center will be connected to all other vote centers or early vote centers (as well as to the County Election Board) via electronic poll books connected via secured internet lines. At least two electronic poll book terminals will be available at each location. Each location, depending on the election, will also have at least one precinct election board, meaning one inspector, at least two judges of opposite parties, and at least two poll clerks of opposite parties. (See Certification that each location above is accessible to voters with disabilities as required by the Help America Vote Act and the Americans with Disabilities Act.)

Voting Equipment

The Election Board chose RBM Consulting. See attached. The initial purchase will be for 15 Openelect (OVO) units, 60 Openelect (OVI) Units, Openelect Software Suite (OCS) and Network Central Program/Tabulator. Paper ballots will be delivered to the vote center prior to opening for Provisional Ballot voting.

Electronic Poll Book

The Election Board chose RBM Consulting for the purchase of 30 Epoll Book-EVID Software, Laptop and printer.

Satellite Vote Centers

Satellite vote centers, which are sites open during the 29 day period prior to each Election Day. Satellite vote centers are places where any voter in the county may vote early absentee-in-person. As required under IC 3-11-10-26.3 and IC 3-11-18.1-4(16), Floyd County will designate at least two satellite vote centers, in addition to the courthouse, and at least one of those sites will also be a vote center on Election Day and will be open for voting the two preceding Saturdays to Election Day.

Poll Workers

Each satellite vote center and Election Day vote center will have at least one traditional precinct election board made up of an Inspector, at least two election Judges of opposite parties, and then at least two clerks of opposite parties, depending on the election size and location of the vote center. Training procedures for poll workers will remain the same.

Vote Center Layout



Voter Education

Floyd County has a full media and community outreach strategy that will involve press releases to newspapers, television stations, and radio stations. In addition we will use our county web site www.floydcounty.in.gov to prepare Floyd County citizens for this change.

Emergency Response

The following narrative describes what would happen in case of an emergency during an election. The first responders to any emergency, either man-made or natural event, are local citizens. Poll workers, volunteers, and police and fire personnel will be the first to identify the problem. The next level of response will come from the Floyd County Commissioners and the Floyd County Election Board in cooperation with the local emergency management agency. If deemed necessary by the County Commissioners, the Office of the Secretary of State's Election Division will be contacted for emergency

assistance. In addition, any action taken either by the Office of the Governor or the Office of the Secretary of State may be taken in consultation with the Office of the Attorney General to ensure that interpretations of the laws are correct.

Five general situations exist in which decision-making may occur regarding the election process and activities in Floyd County:

- Situation Normal-the status quo exists and the process moves forward according to normal laws and procedures.
- Isolated Emergencies-individual precincts or parts of the county experience disruption to the election process and local agencies respond accordingly
- Regional Emergencies-an emergency involving Floyd County and neighboring counties exists and a state-level response is required.
- Catastrophic Emergencies inside Indiana-a large disaster exists that diverts the resources and attention of the citizenry and a state-level response in cooperation with the federal government is required.
- Catastrophic Emergencies outside Indiana-a large disaster exists in the United States that diverts the resources and attention of the citizenry and a federal-level response is required.

The Floyd County Commissioners have worked closely with the local emergency management director, the county sheriff, and local police and fire stations to ensure Floyd County is prepared for emergencies. In addition, the Floyd County Commissioners will be in close communication with the County Election Board should any emergency occur on or surrounding the election process.

In this endeavor to be prepared for an emergency that could occur on or surrounding an Election Day, Floyd County takes the following steps prior to each Election Day:

- Review IC 3-11-8-3.2 which outlines procedures for changing polling locations
- Review of state's Quantity Purchasing Agreements (QPA) whereby Floyd County may buy or lease emergency generators and other supplies.
- Contact is made with power companies to ensure all vote centers have power on Election Day.
- Election company will have support staff in the field or by phone in the event of a disruption
- In the event of a power failure at a vote center, the voting machines and e-poll books will be switched automatically to battery backup.
- In the event that the internet is inaccessible at a vote center location, the eligibility of a voter will be ascertained from records maintained by the Floyd County Voter Registration office via telephone/cell phone.



Each voting tabulator contains:

1. A 320 gig hard drive
2. One solid state, technician removable, non-volatile backup USB memory device (Called a CF or Compact Flash) which is secured deep within the systems internal components
3. A primary, solid state, poll worker removable, non-volatile USB memory device (Called a TM or Transport Media) which is the primary method of transferring election day results from the voting device to the central election management system OCS.

The physical ballots themselves comprise a fourth backup, allowing users to easily tabulate an election manually in the unlikely event that each of the three independent digital copies (as described above) is unavailable. Physical ballots may also be used to manually hand-count or re-scan ballots in the event of a mandatory recount.

System security for the OVO (OpenElect Voting Optical Scan) and the OVI (OpenElect Voting Interface / ADA Component) is addressed in several ways to ensure that the OpenElect system is the most secure vote tabulation product available.

1. Physical Security:

Access to hardware elements of the OpenElect system are protected both physically as well as logically. The OpenElect voting device components are configured in closed cases with a single power connection cable. Hardware ports are disabled during voting, and access to removable media is locked. In addition, all in-precinct units have locks and seals to prevent and detect unauthorized access. A hardware BIOS password is set to prevent any chance of the BIOS defaulting to an unprotected state. In addition, all units run on an encrypted partition.

Access to user features and menu options are password protected and all actions performed on a device will be logged by each unit and can then be uploaded into the central election management system, OCS, later for review.

2. Digital Security:

Each voting device comes preconfigured with a limited-access Linux operating system which has been custom built by Unisyn so that only the required support software and utilities are installed. All other

unnecessary ports and or services are completely removed to ensure maximum security.

Each election has a randomly generated 256 Byte AES encryption key that is created as part of the election definition file, this security key is used to encrypt all election files (including log files)

(Note: The OVI does not store votes and therefore needs only to protect the election data it presents to the voter. Since it has no accessible ports, tampering with election data is prevented both physically and electronically).

In addition to the security measures described above, the OpenElect system also maintains an image of each ballot cast (after being analyzed by the OVO) and stores it on the OVO for upload into the central system post election. Scanned images of each ballot cast may also be used to audit the accuracy of the system. These images are also the basis for Unisyn's Adjudicator software which allows county staff to view ballots on screen.

Vote tally data is stored in an encrypted file which is written to each of the three (Hard Drive, TM, and Secondary USB Drive) storage locations each time a ballot is cast. Each time data is written to the three storage media the system performs an integrity check across all three storage locations to ensure that the written data matches exactly.

3. Data Recovery and Data Storage:

If at any point during the day the power should fail, voters should be encouraged to cast their ballots into the built in "Emergency Ballot Box" on the back of the Unisyn Ballot Box. Once power is restored the public counter will resume, without a loss of ballots cast, once the unit finishes its normal boot cycle. In the event that a unit fails, simply remove the primary memory media (the TM) from the unit, place it into a programmed unit and power on the unit. The vote tally information, which will be retained in full by the TM, will be automatically restored onto the new unit and voting will resume without a loss of ballots cast.

Standard Dialogues

The EVID™ Workstation application was designed specifically to automate routine and specialized tasks poll workers are expected to perform. Each dialogue has been crafted for efficiency and to guide the poll worker through a consistent check-in process.

EVID™ dialogues represent discreet steps in a predefined voter check-in process. Each EVID™ screen presents the operator with a prompt (typically phrased as a question), voter information relevant to the decision and one or more buttons representing possible responses to the prompt. The figure below represents a typical EVID™ "referral" dialogue instructing the operator to process a voter attempting to voter in an incorrect polling place.

As shown in the figure above, the EVID™ dialogue:

- Informs the operator that the voter is at the incorrect polling place;
- Provides relevant information regarding the voter's correct address, polling place and assigned political districts;
- Instructs the operator to ask the voter "Do you wish to be referred to your correct polling place?";
- Operator is presented three options based on the voter's answer: 1) Refer Voter, 2) Process the voter as a provisional ballot or 3) Cancel.

Each and every scenario is executed so that poll workers move down a linear path and follow and answer the prompts. The process is the same for all poll workers and is consistently applied to all voters.

Each process evaluates the check-in information on file for the voter from the Voter Registration System and the information provided by the voter to determine the next process step to be executed. For instance, if a voter is required to show ID before being authorized to vote, EVID™ will automatically present the operator with the appropriate dialogue for executing and completing that requirement.

Data validation of key elements is automatic in EVID™. If an incorrect value is entered by an operator, alerts are generated instructing the operator of the incorrect value.

2. Voter Verification

Specific voter information is presented to the poll worker to insure that the correct voter is located selected for check-in. The information presented for each voter selected during the lookup step includes:

- a. Voter registration number
- b. Precinct
- c. Ballot style
- d. Voter age/Birth date
- e. Complete name
- f. Residential address
- g. Mailing address
- h. Party affiliation

3. Validate Voter ID

If required by local election rules, EVID™ can be configured to guide poll workers through the voter ID verification process. Poll workers are presented with a list of acceptable forms of ID for mail registrants (HAVA) or state rules. During this step, EVID™ may offer poll workers options to select a form of id, accept a voter affirmation or signify that an acceptable form of ID has not been provided with subsequent provisional ballot processing.




4. Verify Signature

EVID™ supports electronic signature capture and comparison. Signatures of record may be imported from voter registration systems and distributed along with other voter information to EVID™ workstations. An optional electronic signature pad may be attached to the EVID™ workstation. A simple EVID™ dialogue, communicating with the signature pad, will present all affirmations or oaths to the voter, capture the voters electronic signature, format the EVID™ display with both the signature of record and the electronic signature for comparison by the poll worker.

5. Issue Voting Authorization

The final step in a typical voter check-in process results in the generation of a "Voting Authorization" ticket. The layout and information contained on this ticket may be customized to comply with customer specifications, but customarily includes voter information, polling location, ballot style and the captured electronic signature or a location for the voter or any other precinct official to physically sign the ticket. In most circumstances the EVID™ "Voting Authorization" ticket is given to the voter who is instructed to subsequently provide it to the voting machine operator or the station that provides the paper ballot. These tickets provide voting machine operators with the information necessary to activate the proper ballot on the machine and are then retained as paper records of each voter authorization.
