# Governor Braun launches Office of Entrepreneurship and Innovation

On July 7, Governor Mike Braun officially launched the Office of Entrepreneurship and Innovation to help Main Street entrepreneurs start, grow, and scale their businesses to grow Indiana's economy and support Hoosier workers.

The office will be led by entrepreneur Brian Schutt. Schutt is the co-founder of Indianapolis co-working space and startup incubator Refinery46, as well as the co-founder of Homesense Heating and Cooling.

"Maureen and I lived the American dream of growing Main Street businesses in our hometown, and I want every Hoosier to have that opportunity. Our goal is to make Indiana the best place in the country to start and build your own business, and the Office of Entrepreneurship and Innovation led by Brian Schutt will be a nation-leading resource to help Main Street entrepreneurs." — Governor Braun

Governor Braun has redirected Indiana's economic development efforts to focus on supporting Hoosier businesses and workers, and spread the benefits of economic development to all four corners of the state, with two North Star priorities: wage growth and new job opportunities.

The Office of Entrepreneurship and Innovation will build on those ideas, and take over some entrepreneurship-focused functions from the IEDC such as overseeing certified technology parks.

The office's primary directives are to:

- Develop and administer programs to support the growth of small business, entrepreneurship, and innovation in Indiana.
- Direct and oversee programs and sources of funding related to the growth of small business, entrepreneurship, technology, and innovation in Indiana.
- Strengthen policies and programs supporting the growth of entrepreneurship in Indiana.
- Coordinate with State agencies and other State-funded entities to align services and programs related to entrepreneurship and starting and scaling a business.
- Work with funded entities to measure funds reaching rural communities, and work with stakeholders and organizations to provide technical support and expand access to resources for entrepreneurs across Indiana.
- Develop and administer programs to support and encourage youth entrepreneurship, including supporting students and teachers in fostering entrepreneurial skills.

The office will be under the Department of Commerce, led by Secretary David Adams.

# \$2 million provided to Indiana food banks through State Department of Agriculture

[Lt. Gov. Micah Beckwith](#) and the [Indiana State Department of Agriculture](#) (ISDA) announced in July that Indiana food banks will receive a combined total of \$2 million to support their efforts in feeding Hoosiers in need.

“More people than we realize are suffering from food insecurity,” [Lt. Gov. Micah Beckwith](#), Indiana’s Secretary of Agriculture and Rural Development said. “These donations support Hoosier families and individuals, and I’m grateful we are able to provide financial support to 11 local food banks.”

According to [Feeding Indiana’s Hungry](#) (FIH), over a million Hoosiers, including 1 in 5 children, experienced food insecurity in 2023, the most recent data available.

“As we have said year after year for nearly five years, our member food banks continue to serve record numbers of Hoosier families. Too

many of our neighbors continue to face difficult choices between paying bills and buying groceries with rising expenses and decreasing accessibility to federal nutrition programs. For any Hoosier to be unsure from where their next meal will come is unacceptable,” said Emily Bryant, executive director of Feeding Indiana’s Hungry.

“We’re grateful for the support of the Indiana General Assembly, Governor Mike Braun and Lt. Gov. Beckwith, and the Indiana State Department of Agriculture for their continued and much needed support to our members to help them serve our Hoosier neighbors and our communities.”

Indiana food pantries and soup kitchens are a subset of food banks. There are 11 food banks which supply pantries and soup kitchens across the state. Each food bank received part of the \$2 million in funding, which supplies community

food pantries, kitchens, churches, and more. This funding will allow food pantries, soup kitchens, and other food distribution centers to receive additional food products from the food bank that serves their location.

ISDA Director Don Lamb is proud to help assist our food banks and pantries that feed Hoosiers.

“Indiana farmers are skilled at growing an abundance of safe, reliable food and food banks and pantries have the necessary resources and skills to distribute large amounts of food to help community members in need,” said Lamb. “We are so thankful for the work food banks, pantries, soup kitchens, and others do for their communities in helping food insecure Hoosiers.”

## Certified Public Manager course begin in September

Ball State University will launch the next round of Certified Public Manager® (CPM) Phase 1 courses in six weeks, with three cohorts beginning in mid-September. The CPM program, offered through Ball State’s Bowen Center for Public Affairs, provides leadership and management training for public sector professionals across Indiana.

Phase 1 courses will be held at the following locations:

- Fort Wayne – Begins September 11, 2025
- Fishers – Two cohorts begin September 11 and September 16, 2025

The CPM curriculum has been fully updated to reflect the current best practices in public management. Participants will develop skills in areas such as organizational leadership, change management, and strategic planning.

The program is nationally accredited by the Certified Public Manager® Consortium and is open to government and nonprofit employees in supervisory or managerial roles.

# IDEM Office of Water Quality recognized by Indiana Water Resource Association

Congratulations to the IDEM Office of Water Quality team for receiving the 2025 [Indiana Water Resources Association's](#) (IWRA) Outstanding Achievement Award - Public Sector for their contributions to Indiana's water resource community!

This award recognizes their exceptional work addressing the complex issue of PFAS (a group of long lasting chemicals) contamination in Indiana. Senior Environmental Manager Cara Kitchen accepted the award during the association's 44th Annual Symposium.

"It was an honor for us to receive the IWRA Outstanding Achievement Award for our PFAS sampling project. The PFAS sampling at public water systems has been ongoing for several years, and it is nice to see staff receive this well-deserved recognition. Water systems can now make informed decisions on how to best prepare for the upcoming federal PFAS drinking water regulation. Staff's teamwork, dedication, and hard work have helped ensure Indiana's drinking water is safer for all Hoosiers," said Drinking Water Branch Chief Matt Prater.

A public water system provides piped water for human consumption through at least 15 service connections or serves 25+ individuals daily for 60+ days a year and includes schools and childcare facilities. Over 700 public water systems participated in the sampling project.

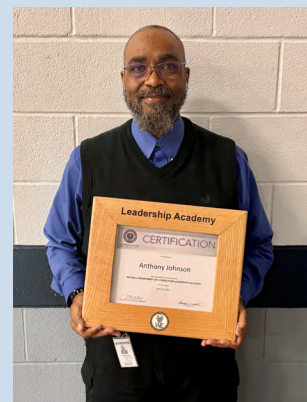

# OPE staff worked behind the scenes to make 'Top Workplace' goal a reality

The Indiana Department of Health's Office of Performance Excellence (OPE) shared some exciting news with their employees earlier this year—they were named a Top Workplace by USA Today and the IndyStar. OPE's Quentin Cummings, Tasha Ramey, and Lotus Myers were able to keep this agency news under wraps until Public Service Recognition Week (PSRW), sharing it at the IDOH Awards ceremony. But the achievement required some coordinating behind the scenes.

OPE staff shared how they worked together to make it happen and for Cummings, it's been a goal since day 1.

"As I transitioned into the agency, it was communicated that we'd love to earn this 'Top Workplace Award' recognition," he said. It was a chance to showcase what they already knew—that OPE was a great place to work.

To become recognized as a Top Workplace by USA Today and/or the IndyStar, employees of a given business must answer a survey. A certain percentage of employees have to complete the survey to qualify for the designation and the responses have to reflect a positive work culture.

Cummings and the team got to work right away with an emphasis on engaging the agency and reaching the required 35% response threshold. They posted flyers in high traffic areas, had face-to-face conversations, and reached out to leadership so they could encourage

their teams to participate. The outreach blitz continued with Ramey and Myers setting up an info table that included State Health Commissioner Lindsay Weaver, MD, FACEP. Email reminders helped seal the deal in time to meet the deadline and all requirements.

Cummings called it "grassroots marketing" with an emphasis on individual connections. When all was said and done, the campaign was a huge success, nearly doubling the required 35% response rate to 65%.

"It celebrates the organization's willingness to be outstanding within the workplace," Cummings said. "It's based on feedback from leadership, innovation, and work life balance as well (IDOH also nabbed a nod for that), and so our employees really spoke highly to how we are taking care of the employee experience from that perspective. So, I was really excited for the agency employee group, but I was also excited for the staff development and engagement group because they did so much to make this come to fruition."

All three team members said the Top Workplace designation shows

that IDOH is not only a great place to work for current employees, but that future talent will be drawn to the agency because of it as well.

"This is this is a great boost for us to gain talent and to uphold our mission," Myers said. "There are hardworking employees out there to help us and to uphold us and to carry on that mission because the mission that we have for Hoosiers is a very heavy lift. So yeah, this this will be a great 'magnetic pull' for us in the workforce market out there."

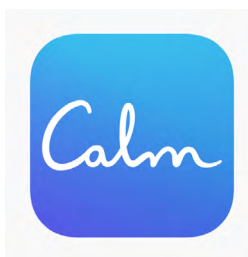

## World TB Day recaps year of progress

The Indiana Department of Health (IDOH) celebrated World TB Day with its annual summit on June 10, bringing approximately 100 IDOH and local health department staffers, and healthcare providers to Indiana Government Center South.

World TB Day was a chance to look back on the achievements in tuberculosis treatment and prevention on a global scale. IDOH staff joined others from across the state to hear clinical and laboratory updates, alongside other important topics, including TB in Indiana and a story from a TB survivor.

Presenters included Indiana Department of Health Chief Medical Officer Guy Crowder, MD, MPHTM, who discussed tuberculosis (TB) on a global scale, looking at trends and progress on the goal of ending TB; and Maliki Yacouba, PhD., IDOH TB Prevention and Care Director, who presented epidemiological data.

IDOH Laboratory's Mycobacteriology Lab Supervisor Jessica Gentry provided updates from IDOHL, while TB Prevention Program Manager Gurpreet Dhillon discussed respiratory restrictions for community settings.

# Indiana Archaeology Month

September is the 30th anniversary of a statewide celebration of archaeology in Indiana. What began as Indiana Archaeology Week in 1996 expanded in 2002 to become Indiana Archaeology Month because of vigorous interest and demand for archaeology related events. The Department of Natural Resources (DNR) Division of Historic Preservation & Archaeology (DHPA) coordinates the event to encourage learning about Indiana archaeology, archaeological sites in the state, and the laws that protect them. Universities, museums, organizations, and individuals around the state host a variety of archaeology programs and activities.



## 2025 Poster



Cemeteries are examples of Indiana cultural landscapes. The poster theme this year focuses on how archaeologists play important roles in the documentation and investigation of cemeteries. The poster includes images showing archaeological investigation and laboratory work related to cemeteries, as well as examples of artifact types recovered during several cemetery relocation projects.

State laws protect Hoosier cemeteries, and archaeological work is a key component for preserving, documenting, and protecting cemeteries. These places are more than just serene landscapes of monuments and memorials of lost loved ones. They are also physical landmarks that provide a connection to the past, preserve the history of communities, reveal cultural practices, and reflect social change. DHPA staff archaeologists help implement cemetery laws (e.g., Indiana Code 14-21-1) through the review of cemetery development plans regarding proposed ground disturbance within 100 feet of cemeteries and work plans regarding their investigation.
